Dear Council at the Malleus Dei Institute:

Greetings in the Lord Jesus Christ. We want to thank you again for your interest and participation in the Reformation Party, and we look forward to the prospect that God is raising up a party in Brazil like He has in the US.

People in Brazil can join the Reformation Party in one of two ways:

1. They can send an email to [info@reformationparty.org](mailto:info@reformationparty.org) providing the information indicated at <http://www.reformationparty.org/membership.htm>, which includes their desire to be a member of the Reformation Party, agreement with the original Westminster Standards, agreement with the Party platform, and nature and location of their church membership, along with contact information.
2. If they lack email, they can send the information requested in 1 via someone who is already a member of the Reformation Party. This Reformation Party member will serve as the means of communication between the new member and the Reformation Party.

Regarding the formation of a party in Brazil, here are the steps the Council of Officers of the Reformation Party (in the US) envisions:

1. At least 10 voting members residing in Brazil need to be registered as such with the Reformation Party (in the US), having joined the Reformation Party as described above.
2. At least 3 men qualified to be councilmen for what would become the first Council of Officers for the Reformation Party in Brazil would need to register as such with the Reformation Party (in the US).
3. We need to be sure that the men registering to run for the first Council of Officers for the Reformation Party in Brazil will be able to conference with one another on the council. This especially needs to be determined if they are geographically separated. Also, we need to make sure the men registering will be adequately qualified to administer the Reformation Party – Brazil within the context of Brazilian law and regulations.
4. The Council of Officers of the Reformation Party (in the US) would oversee elections of the first Council of Officers for the Reformation Party in Brazil.
5. Once there is a first Council of Officers for the Reformation Party in Brazil, from that point on there will be a Reformation Party – US and a Reformation Party – Brazil, making up the Confederation of Reformation Party National Councils. Representatives from each of the national branches will periodically have Confederation meetings, at least via internet or teleconference.

Until the above steps have taken place, there is not really a functioning Reformation Party – Brazil. Therefore, we would prefer to postpone establishing foundations in Brazil until there is a functioning Reformation Party – Brazil. Our council based here in the US does not feel qualified to oversee the formation of such foundations in Brazil, since we are not knowledgeable in Brazilian laws and regulations.

With respect to the matter of running candidates in Brazil, we hope in a future correspondence to engage you in discussion on this topic.

Finally, we would like to inform you that our Council has established a Board of Theological Advisors for its 2012 term consisting of those Reformation Party voting members who are either ministers or theological doctors and would be willing to serve on the Board. For those of you who are so qualified, we would appreciate if you would seriously consider serving on the Board.

Again, thank you for your interest in this cause to seek by God's grace to encourage reformation.
